Compton residents should have received a letter from Surrey County Council advising there will be two four-hour sessions in Compton Village Hall for viewing the latest traffic calming plans and providing views. These include village gates, a 20 mph section at the western end, low raised tables at either end, and at some junctions, together with some pedestrian and crossing improvements. The dates are Monday 3 February 4pm to 8pm AND Wednesday 5 February 11am to 3pm.

It is vital that Compton residents attend one or other meeting, consider the plans and give views at one of the sessions as well as online at https://comptonvillage.commonplace.is where the plans will be available from 3 February. When giving views, please do consider and comment on the implications for the village as a whole as well as for your particular location.

Compton Parish Council and the Compton Traffic Group have a long history of engagement with Surrey County Council and Surrey Police regarding the adverse impacts to the village residents of high traffic volume, excessive speeding, lack of driver care and poor paths and pedestrian crossing layout. This has included Speedwatch teams from 2008, three Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) purchased by the Parish and installed in 2010, and speed surveys undertaken in 2015, 2018 and 2023.

The possibility of installing average speed cameras as an option to physical highway works has been discussed with the authorities for several years. Last year it was thought this would be offered but it is understood that option has now been withdrawn. Parish Council and the Traffic Group continue to lobby to have that option made available. 

Born in Edinburgh, saxophonist Jo Fooks was named 'Young Scottish Jazz Musician of the Year' in 1992, which led to study at the Guildhall and a scholarship to Berklee School of Music's summer jazz programme. Subsequently, she received an invitation from British trumpeter Humphrey Lyttelton to join his band, touring all over the UK. Citing Humph's "fun-filled and melodic" approach as a major influence (along with Illinois Jacquet, Sonny Rollins, Dexter Gordon & Cannonball Adderley), Jo's big, bright sound has also been compared to iconic players such as Stan Getz.

COMPTON TRIPTYCH REUNITED AT GODALMING MUSEUM

In 2011, sculptor **Jon Edgar** searched for Compton clay to work on a head of former curator of the **Watts Gallery**, **Richard Jefferies**. Jon came across *Brickfields Pottery*, the home of artist/potter **Mary Wondrausch** (1923-2016; her self-designed grave and relief panels are worth visiting at the top of the **Memorial Chapel** grounds, in Compton cemetery).

Mary offered a bag of clay quarried from work on the foundation of her house but Jon felt it would be a sacrilege not to use the material for a sitting with the remarkable woman he had just met. This posed a dilemma. Having previously used the idea of three linked



heads, he felt it appropriate to think of a third head to create a Triptych for Compton. An appeal was launched in the *Compton NEWS* and a number of candidates, both living and historic, were suggested. Jon thought it fairest to select solely on the strength of feeling in the Parish as all suggestions were equally sincere. This meant that he had not even seen the subject prior to starting the head, which made it more interesting. **Jane Turner**, described as a "village stalwart", turned out to be the chosen candidate for the third head.

The three heads were part of The Living Clay exhibition at the **Lewis Elton Gallery** at the University of Surrey. Subsequently, the head of Richard Jefferies was displayed at the entrance to the newly named Richard Jefferies Gallery in the restored Watts Gallery in 2011. After it was removed, the three heads went their separate ways on various loans. The three terracottas have now been reunited and have been acquired by **Godalming Museum** for <u>perpetuity</u>.

Jon has a new carving at **WINCHESTER ARC's** *Every Step of the Way* exhibition between <u>April and July</u>; his 'Portal' carving (2013) sits on the old A3 route at Hindhead.

GODALMING MUSEUM has several exhibitions running in February:

- *Blue Sky Artists*. Tuesday 7 January to Saturday 15 February. A small group of local professional and semi-professional artists who exhibit together at various UK venues in London and across the south of England.
- Charterhouse Art Takeover in Godalming. <u>Tuesday 18 February to Saturday 15 March</u>. Throughout the month of February, CHARTERHOUSE SCHOOL is showcasing artwork created by year groups from 9 to 12. From textiles to

On <u>Tuesday 11 February</u>, ARTS SOCIETY WOKING's talk is *New Dawn. A Memorial for Women's Suffrage, Houses of Parliament*. Speaker Mary Branson is best known for her large-scale conceptual light installations, particularly the iconic *New Dawn 2016* sculpture in the **Houses of Parliament**, which celebrates the centenary of the Suffrage movement and is the first permanent piece of contemporary abstract art in the **Palace of Westminster**. She has created works for the **London 2012**OLYMPICS, THE MAGNA CARTA MEMORIAL at Runnymede, ROYAL HOLLOWAY UNIVERSITY and more recently *Harvest*, a huge site-specific installation at **Box Hill, Surrey** in collaboration with the **National Trust**. Branson is an award-winning print maker, a choreographer for performance and dance events, and a mentor and public speaker, having lately returned from a lecture tour to New York and Washington DC. She has held a number of artistic residencies, including for Parliament and HM Prison service, where she led an art group for women prisoners. Branson is artist in residence at Watts Gallery.
